## Parents view historical figures at the Grade 3 Wax Museum

Friday, December 10, was a big day for Puxi campus third grade students. For the third year in a row, history came to life in the third grade hallway at Puxi campus elementary school.

Third grade students produced their very own living wax museum for fellow students and parents. This museum was a collection of historical figures represented by students. Costumed students stood silently and frozen in time while waiting for visitors to press a "play" button. Parents and student visitors listened to the stories of famous and historical people such as inventors, presidents, astronauts, and athletes. Third graders shared first-person narrations of the people they researched telling their life story and highlighting achievements.



Third graders worked for about a month researching their famous person and preparing for the presentations. The students read biographies and searched pre-selected websites to obtain background information about their historical person. Then they organized their notes and after lessons in writing good paragraphs, each student wrote one or two paragraph reports about the person. Once the report was finished, they served as a basis for speeches. Students wrote a one-minute first person speech that they would give as their wax museum creations. Finally, students completed a poster about their famous person.



Third graders practiced reciting their speeches before the big day. Students worked hard to memorize their speeches and practice public speaking skills. When the big day arrived, students dressed up as their characters, brought in props, and standing before their poster, they did an incredible job of sharing the information they learned.

Fun was had by all, and most importantly third graders learned about famous people who have made an impact on the world.

# Puxi students travel to Guangzhou for APAC Orchestra '10

November is always an exciting month for young orchestral players in SAS Puxi, because it is the time when the APAC fine arts are held. This year the APAC Orchestra '10 took place November 17-21.

APAC Orchestra event 2010 was held in the American International School of Guangzhou. The participating schools included Taejon Christian International School, Canadian Academy, Western Academy of Beijing, Shanghai American School Puxi, and the host school, American International School of Guangzhou.

Prior to the musical event, the Puxi students, under the guidance of Mary Siew, attended mandatory Tuesday practices for many weeks. The rehearsals, each lasting two to three hours, were quite demanding and exhausting for students at times. However, this preparation and dedication definitely paid off during the actual APAC festival. Puxi

musicians played with stamina and flair. Schools were invited to audition for solo places for the Vivaldi Concerto Grosso. Three out of four soloists selected for the solo parts in the *Vivaldi Concerto Grosso in B minor for 4 Violins* were SAS violinists — Ethan Tsai, Sam Wu and Sean Liu (solos 2, 3 and 4 respectively). It was a proud moment for SAS when the names of soloists were announced!

The young musicians of the APAC orchestra '10 had the honor of being conducted by Maestro Matthew Hazelwood, who has established a unique reputation in both professional and educational fields. He is known for his individual professional skill, passionate advocacy for young musicians, and visionary arts leadership. So far, he has been Music Director/Conductor of more than 25 different professional opera productions as well as more than 100 ballet performances.

One thing that definitely distinguished Maestro Hazelwood from other conductors with whom the orchestra has met was his emphasis on the importance of changing tone color of bow-

ing and pizzicato for contrast. Leaving the emphasis on intonation and rhythm to the sectional rehearsals, Maestro Hazelwood would always tell the young musicians that a beautiful tone can be only made when the musicians are playing every note with both body and soul, never neglecting the quality of sound of each note.

The musical pieces performed by APAC Orchestra on the Saturday concert included *Holberg Suite* (Prelude, Air, Rigaudon) by Edvard Grieg, *Psalm and Fugue* by Alan Hovhannes, *Colloquy for Strings* by Abbe Gesben, *Concerto in B Minor for Four Violins* by Antonio Vivaldi, and *Concerto Grosso for Four String Orchestras* by Ralph Vaughan-Williams.

APAC Orchestra does much more than just travel and rehearse for hours. The APAC Festival is about forming new friendships, creating a sound unique to that ensemble of players, and learning valuable lessons from a guest conductor.

The American International school of Guangzhou were won-

derful hosts and were responsible for organizing our rehearsals at the Crowne Plaza Hotel! It was a treat to play in such plush surroundings and certainly a great final APAC for six of us seniors.

During the most recent American Thanksgiving holiday, blessings were acknowledged and thanks were given. Among these blessings were no doubt health, family and good friends. Although the over 100 swimmers who migrated 2600 miles south to Singapore for the weekend also appreciated these items, they had a few other things on their mind. During the annual SAS Santa Clause Swim Meet a few more non-traditional benedictions

could be heard. Things like “Thanks for not swimming fly in the relay”, “Thanks for a I won my heat

ribbon” and “Thanks for no disqualifications” rang loud and clear throughout the Singapore American School campus.

In the truest athletic form of “One School: Two Campuses,” SAS Puxi and Pudong combined their teams and traveled to Singapore as one united front. Ready to battle all comers, and a battle it was. Although 11 schools attended the meet, it was clear from the start that this would be a two horse race all weekend long.
