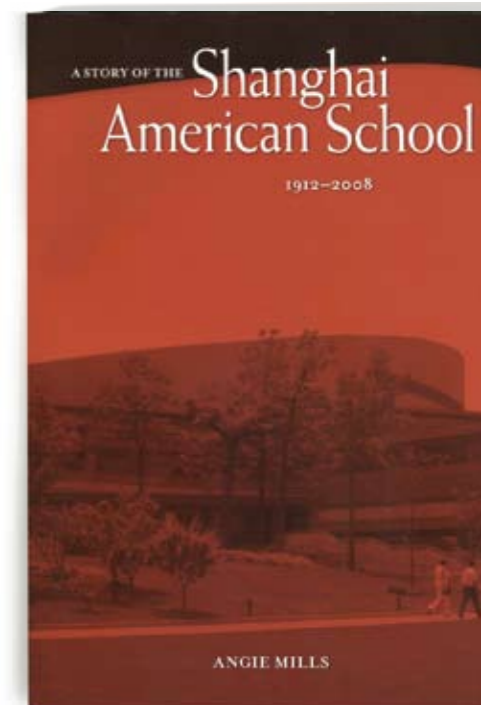
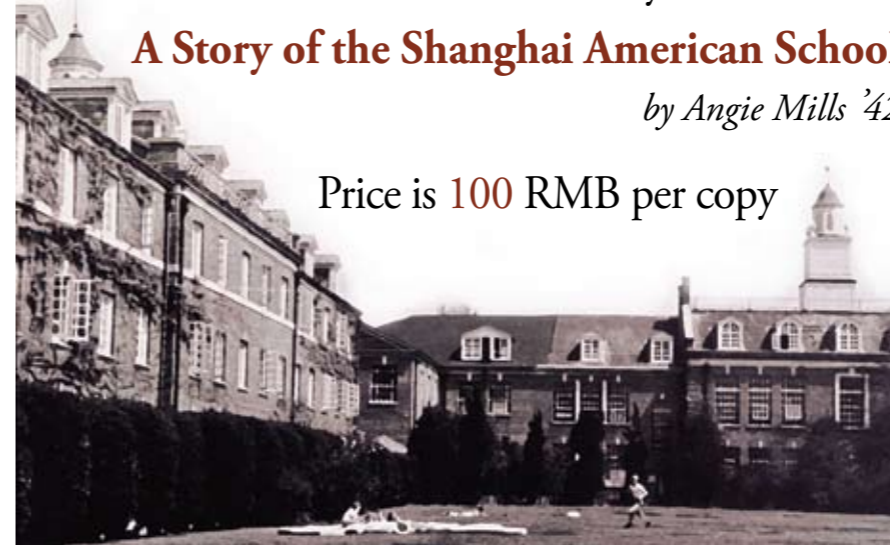

Target **hunger!**

Hit **poverty!**

It was 12:00 a.m. February 10, Thursday night, and exactly 24 hours before the 30-hour fast was to be broken. Kept awake by excitement, IB-induced stress, and nervousness, I couldn't help but to wonder: Would we be again successful in beating our ambitious fundraising goal?

This year's 30-Hour Famine event was to be the biggest ever. We had increased the number of lock-in participants to 120 people. We even had raised our goal for donations to 120,000 RMB. Since this program was started three years ago, the activity has evolved quite a lot, but I would have never imagined that it would have grown to such a large scale.



It wasn't until the actual Famine sleepover that I realized that while change is such a constant at this school, some qualities within the student body remain the same. Throughout the entire 30-hour fasting, I did not hear any complaining about hunger. Everybody remained positive and

energetic despite not having eaten since 6 p.m. the night before. Even my fellow IB students with their saggy sleep-deprived eyes were consistently cheerful and active while participating in all the activities.

The most comforting thought of the night for me was the fact that we were, at least for a long moment, able to make the participants truly believe we could eradicate world hunger. We were so lucky to have Eleanor Leyden, HS Global Languages teacher, as guest speaker, and to watch a recent video she made of an interview with the director of an organization in South Africa devoted to combating hunger. The most thought-provoking videos about various world hunger issues created by the Theory of Knowledge classes were also shown. For one night, it seemed that everyone genuinely cared about putting an end to world hunger.

We broke our fast 12:00 a.m. with delicious sandwiches, coleslaw and chips from New York City Deli, our gracious sponsor for the past two years. The next morning we had muffins and coffee for our breakfast, generously donated by Starbucks China. Although fasting for 30 hours does not even touch what it truly feels to be starving, it certainly has renewed our appreciation for the food we automatically assume will be there for us, and for knowing that during our lives we want world hunger to end.



This year we raised 150,000 RMB (almost \$23,000) for World Vision in their fight to end world hunger. We have once again reached beyond our goal. As a form of celebration, this year's 30 Hour Famine student leaders had paint balloons splattered all over them and even cups of paint poured on them (see photos). Similar to last year's campaign of "Baldness Goes Away but Hunger Doesn't Without Our Help" (when we shaved several leaders and HS English teacher Marnie Rosen bald once we reached our target of 100,000 kuai), we wanted to show everyone "Paint Washes Off and Disappears, but Hunger Still Hasn't Yet".

As I lay down next to my comrades from the committee, fearing our paint-pouring doom, I could not help but smile. Thank you Brenda, Lance, Joel, Emily, Lenz, Wei Song, Jacob, James, Galahad and our many 'minions'. Thank you Bob Gould and Marnie Rosen for being so supportive in letting us create our own lock-in, and for even being supportive in allowing us to make our own mistakes. And thanks most of all to the community and students who supported our venture, ensuring every year we raise more money AND awareness than the year before!

The Pudong campus SAS high school and the 30-Hour Famine thanks **NEW YORK CITY DELI for being our community sponsor and for providing a ton of food to help us break our fast. Especially with the current bleak economic outlook, we cannot take for granted the generosity of local establishments to sponsor events such as the 30-Hour Famine. Next time you are in this JinQiao restaurant, remember to thank them for their community spirit and their support of SAS!**

Parent-to-Teacher feedback survey continues through March 14

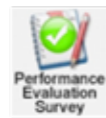

Laptop Program News for 2011-12

Students enrolling in 7th grade and any new students in grades 8-12 will be levied the laptop fee which remains at 11500 RMB. The fee will provide for onsite services, manufacturing defect and software warranty, a bag, a lock and a variety of school owned software installed on the machine.



Non-SAS Macs Next Year?

We will only allow new students who have attended Macintosh 1:1 schools to bring their own computers to school next year in grades 7-11. It should be noted that this is only after their machine is certified to have met our instructional requirements. Any current student who is enrolled at SAS grade 6 or any new students who are not currently enrolled at a Macintosh 1:1 school will pay the required SAS technology fee and receive the computer, software, services and benefits of the laptop program.

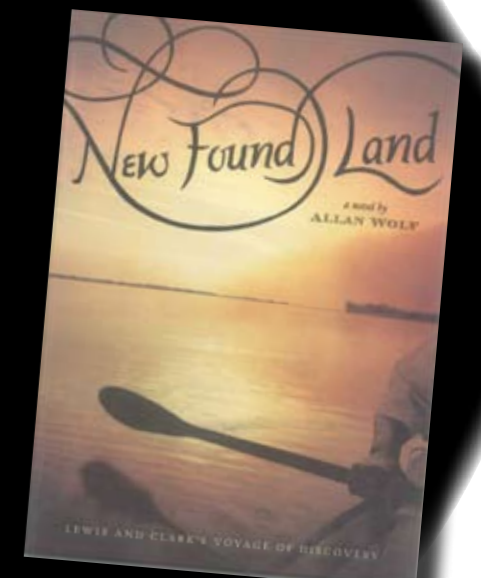
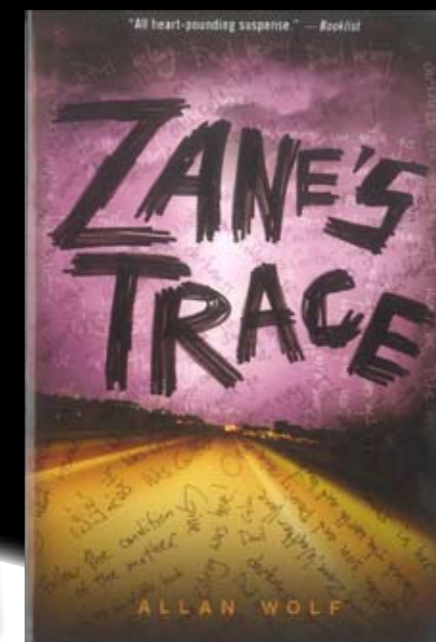
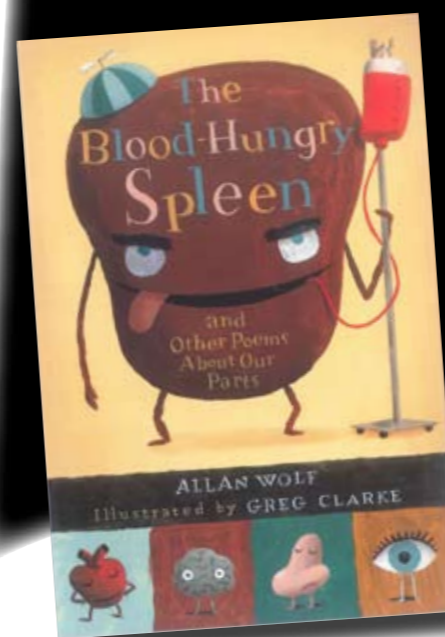

After teaching at Virginia Tech, Wolf became the Education Director for Poetry Alive!, a national touring company that presents theatrical poetry for all ages. The Shanghai American Middle schools are proud to present Allan Wolf to our students to share his joy of creating through writing. Allan has just completed a week with the middle school students on the Puxi campus where he facilitated poetry workshops for all students, enjoyed student literary luncheons, and finished the week with an all middle school assembly in the Performing Arts Center. Fortunately we have uncovered no writing on any of the walls during his time on Puxi campus.

Next week, March 7-11, Wolf will work with students and teachers on the Pudong campus. During his visit East, he will present his book of poems "The Blood Hungry Spleen" to six grade students. Next, he will facilitate poetry workshops focused on personal narratives to 7th grade students. Finally, Wolf will use his newest book, *New Found Land: Lewis and Clark's Voyage of Discovery*, to help eighth-grade students turn nonfiction narratives into poetic verse. Each of these activities have been specifically selected and designed by the grade level teams to extend current classroom activities.
