EggsChange project will start selling organic eggs to Puxi campus next school year

In April, the EggsChange Project provided six farmers in Guan Po village, Jiang Xi province, each with 50 chickens. A trip will be made on June 17 to Jiang Xi by high school students in the EggsChange Club to visit the current farmers, and also select new farmers for the second phase of the project.

Starting in the beginning of next school year, there will be 300 eggs being shipped from JiangXi on a daily basis. (Depending on the season, egg production varies thus boxes will be shipped once a day or once every two days.) The chickens are raised according to strict organic procedures. They are permitted to roam outside freely during the day (in natural, unpolluted habitats approved by specialists), and sleep in special sheds at night. Chicken feed, provided by us, are all natural rice seeds. We also have specialists and vets on hand to check on these chickens on a weekly basis.

In early August, the chicken will start laying eggs. These all-natural eggs are then shipped to Shanghai and will be on sale to interested parents and teachers. Eggs are bought from the farmers at 2 RMB each, and sold at 3 RMB each to cover shipping costs, the smooth running of this project and to guarantee future sustainability. There will be no profit made. Boxes of 30 eggs will be on sale for 90 RMB to all students and teachers of Puxi campus. make something out of the individual. Whether it be through bundling up before getting off the bus and into the deadly deserts with roaring wind storms, or riding a camel for the first time, tasting new delicacies, or communicating with others; we made ourselves gain some insight into another culture, another way of life, and another aspect of our host country. Keeping in mind our "global citizenship," it is safe to say that the 44 students participating on this trip rolled down the towering sand dunes more open-minded and ready to face the world.

Group 2: The Confucius Group: This group spent the morning at a peasant painting farm to learn about how peasant painting works and even did some of their own. Then they drove to the TaiPing Valley National Park for a Subway-packed lunch and four hours of hiking. At a lake, students played in the water in the lakes and learned to skip rocks. "I loved the time spent playing in the river on the mountain hike," said David Baxter, Puxi campus MS math teacher. "I think we should try to add more of these kinds of physical activities into future trips."

Group 3: Warriors. These students spent the morning on the Xian City Wall for Tai-Chi, then went to the Terracotta Warrior workshops to learn how replica Terracotta Warrior are made. After lunch, they headed to the Terracotta Warrior Museums to see the actual Terracotta Warriors.

Day 3: After a nice breakfast at their campsite, the Adventurers went abseiling and had lunch afterward. Finally, they came back to Xian from their overwhelming camping trip. They met with the Confucius bus in the bowling alley for a night of bowling.

Day 4: The Adventurers went to a martial arts center where they were taught and prac-

ticed some moves with certain weapons. The other groups went to local schools in Xian where they painted a mural, shared some English books, and played table tennis and basketball with the local kids. They met up in a dumpling banquet in the De Fang Chang Restaurant. From there, they went to the Xian Muslim Quarters where Muslims from Xian sell goods. The SAS students seemed to enjoy bargaining. After shopping, we headed to the train station for an overnight train back to Shanghai which was probably the highlight of the trip.

"This trip was definitely worth going through all the difficult planning and organizing, especially if I think that the students benefited from it," said Baxter. "Most of the teachers on these trips actually ENJOY spending four days with a bunch of rowdy sixth graders!"

ment, one can only imagine the variety of cultural experiences, discoveries, and new learning that took place along the way. Whether it was during Tai Chi at sunrise, a challenging hike up to an overlook, a bonfire experience with a new friend, or even the taste of a local dish, this is what makes up what we call the China Alive experience.

Referring to the beach and ocean, Anne Chua said "I loved the low tide experience at night where we could walk out really far and then it got even shallower because of a sand bar." One of the student's favorite beach experiences was this nighttime treasure hunt where teams of students explored the low tide flats and were awed by the plentiful nocturnal aquatic and beach creatures. The evening ended with a bonfire and S'mores on the beach. Students spent two full days living on a beach ecosystem discussing a variety of elements such as sand formation, patterns, and movement, the cause

and effects of the tides, man's impact on the beach, ocean wave physics, and more. Activities included team building, tide flux measurements, water safety, fishing, snorkeling, a Kayak team race, and a beach sweep to observe and remove debris.

Speaking about the rainforest, Grace Ang exclaimed, "I thought the diversity of plant and animal life in tropical rainforest at Yanoda was amazing especially the various colors of Bougainvillea where I learned that the flower color was actually not the flower pedals but just colorful leaves."

Kate Zahn added, "I was amazed at how the ants formed a line or trail on the

A Kidsummer Night's Dream

When kids think of Shakespeare, they often think of long, boring and confusing plays about romance or tragedy. *A Kidsummer Night's Dream*, Puxi campus middle school's recent production, changed all that negative thinking. This musical fantasy made Shakespeare understandable and packed a humorous punch as well.

"A Kidsummer Night's Dream was very creative," said Adrian Lee, G7, who was the main character in the



middle school's 2010 play *Ernie's Incredible Illucinations*, "because it was easy to understand, and it was funny at the same time." On May 13-14 SAS students, teachers, and parents watched a fantastic production of *A Kidsummer Night's Dream*, a musical fantasy written by Bartlett-Billings-Fairbairn-Leehy-O'Mara and directed by Juanita McGarrigle, MS Drama Teacher. The play is based on Shakespeare's classic comedy, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and is full of the same mischief, misunderstandings and magic as the original play.

A short while after *Ernie's Incredible Illucinations*, McGarrigle picked out *A Kidsummer Night's Dream*. The cast was made up of 22 students and five high school helpers. "I knew the 8th-graders were studying William Shakespeare," said McGarrigle, "I also knew this play was written in kid-friendly language, and I thought it would be fun to show the Greek world of mortals and fairies." As it turned out, she was right. The play was easy to understand and fun to watch.

After one look at the awesome set, you'd know that a huge amount of time and effort went into designing and creating it. McGarrigle designed the sets herself. Then the Stage Craft class in the high school built the framework for the sets as part of their class, while the play's crew, along with McGarrigle, Melanie Ryan, G7 social studies teacher, and Lutz Papenfuss (McGarrigle's husband-to-be) built and created the detailed pieces.

Xiao Jian, technician at the PAC, was also an important part of the production.

She explained that after describing her ideas, Xiao Jian, using a computer, created the lighting and atmosphere McGarrigle wanted. As many in the audience agreed, the result was fantastic.

In addition to the set design, the props, costumes and poster art for the production were also designed by McGarrigle. She brought some of the props from London for the play, such as the UV make-up which glows under ultraviolet light, and the fake ears and noses. These added considerably to the "fantasy" of the play.

An enormous amount of effort was put into this project. McGarrigle, the cast, and the crew spent 89 hours spread over three months to master the production. The rehearsal schedule for the student actors was extremely demanding. The students practiced an average of two hours each day. "For any show to run smoothly, you have to practice everything," McGarrigle said. "We have to practice the lines, the positions, rotating the sets, and the special effects."

McGarrigle did an enormous amount of thinking and worrying about *A Kidsummer Night's Dream*, especially after the students returned from China Alive and many of them had forgotten their lines. But it all turned out for the best in the end. "I'm very proud of this production. There's a saying in theatre, that if you have a terrible dress

rehearsal, you'll have a fantastic show. Which is exactly what happened! When we had two fantastic shows, I was very, very happy," she said.

Has *A Kidsummer Night's Dream* surpassed its predecessor, *Ernie's Incredible Illucinations*? It has, according to McGarrigle. "I'm already looking for a cool script for next year to meet the higher expectations the audience has for the middle school plays! But for now, this is the play I'm the most proud of."

Once again, the High School Community Service club had another wonderful year. As one of the largest service organizations at SAS Puxi, we work with various institutions in our local community, as well as promote awareness and initiate fundraisers for other charity causes.

We even adopted a new motto: "Got Love?". This embodies the spirit of our club, a club that is motivated by our love for helping people around us.

Here is a brief summary of our accomplishments this year:



SAS Community Service Club members

Thursday Trips: Every Thursday after school, members visit one of the five institutions. Some teach English to children from Grade 1-9 at migrant schools (Hua Bo Li, Qing Pu or Old Qing Pu). Some visit Jin Niu Kindergarten to play, draw and sing with toddlers. Others chat, perform, fold origami, play games and have a good time with the elderly at the Retirement Center. A special bond is created, while they gain communication and leadership skills and exposure to Chinese culture. Despite language barriers, a smile is a universal language after all, and sometimes simply showing that you care is enough to make a difference.

Anhui Trip: On the weekend of 15th May 2011, a group of Community Service officers visited Lao Wang's Orphanage in Anhui (The Deformed Orphans Relief Association of Yingshang County). This orphanage provides shelter and survival support for more than 210 abandoned children, aging from newborn babies to teenagers. Half are disabled in some way. Though we have raised funds for them for two years, this was our first trip. Interacting with the children was extremely fruitful and rewarding, and we anticipate many more visits in years to come!

Fundraisers: As a team, we organized several successful fundraisers.

In November, we held our *12th Annual Thanksgiving Dinner*, planned for SAS staff as well as leaders of the institutions we work with. SAS Jazz Band, Brass Ensemble, Orchestra, Barber-shop Girls and the Chinese department, as well as migrant school children and retirement center elderly were invited to perform at the event. Guests also received the opportunity to win raffle prizes from sponsors such as Element Fresh, Melrose Pizza, 3Top, Dragonfly, Barefoot Portraits, Papa Johns, Kommune, West Hair

Salon, Coldstone, Siemens etc. It was truly a wonderful dinner, as we gathered to appreciate everything Shanghai and SAS has shared with us.

We also held a *Lucky Draw* fundraiser throughout the year. For 10RMB, participants can pick a post-it from an array, for an opportunity to win up to 200RMB of food vouchers. More than 1.29 million students around the world participate in World Maths Day

Jason Zou ranks high in math contest against hundreds of thousands of peers

This year the Puxi campus of Shanghai American School participated in World Maths Day, an annual international math facts competition. More than 1.29 million students and from more than 22,000 schools from 212 countries took part in World Maths Day 2011. Students were separated into four age categories, approximately 300,000 students per category.

Jason Zou, a Grade 5 student from Molly Doud's class, ranked 47th in the world (!) in his age category, earning him a spot in the Hall of Fame. Very impressive indeed.

About World Maths Day: What do the students do?

Students play at home and at school against other students around the world in live games of mental arithmetic. Each game lasts for 60 seconds and students can play up to 100 games, earning points for their personal tally. The students who answer the most questions correctly appear on the Hall of Fame. There are five levels of play, 20 games on each level.

This year in grade five at the Puxi campus, with the help of Noreen Croyle, students piloted the Mathleticsinteractive program to improve their basic

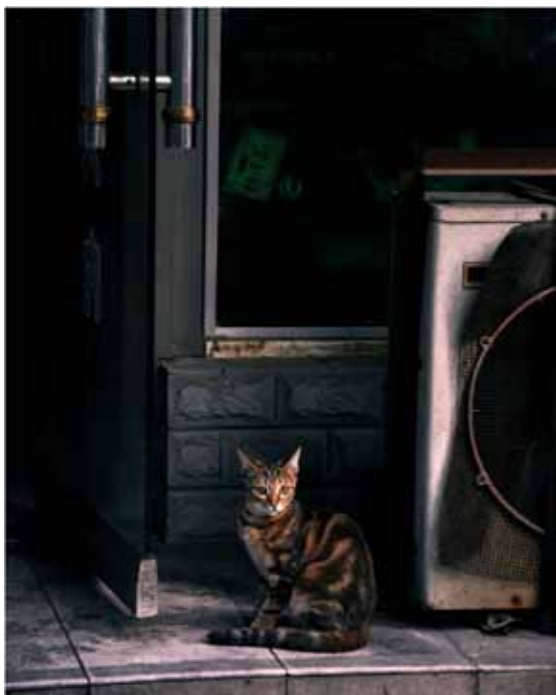

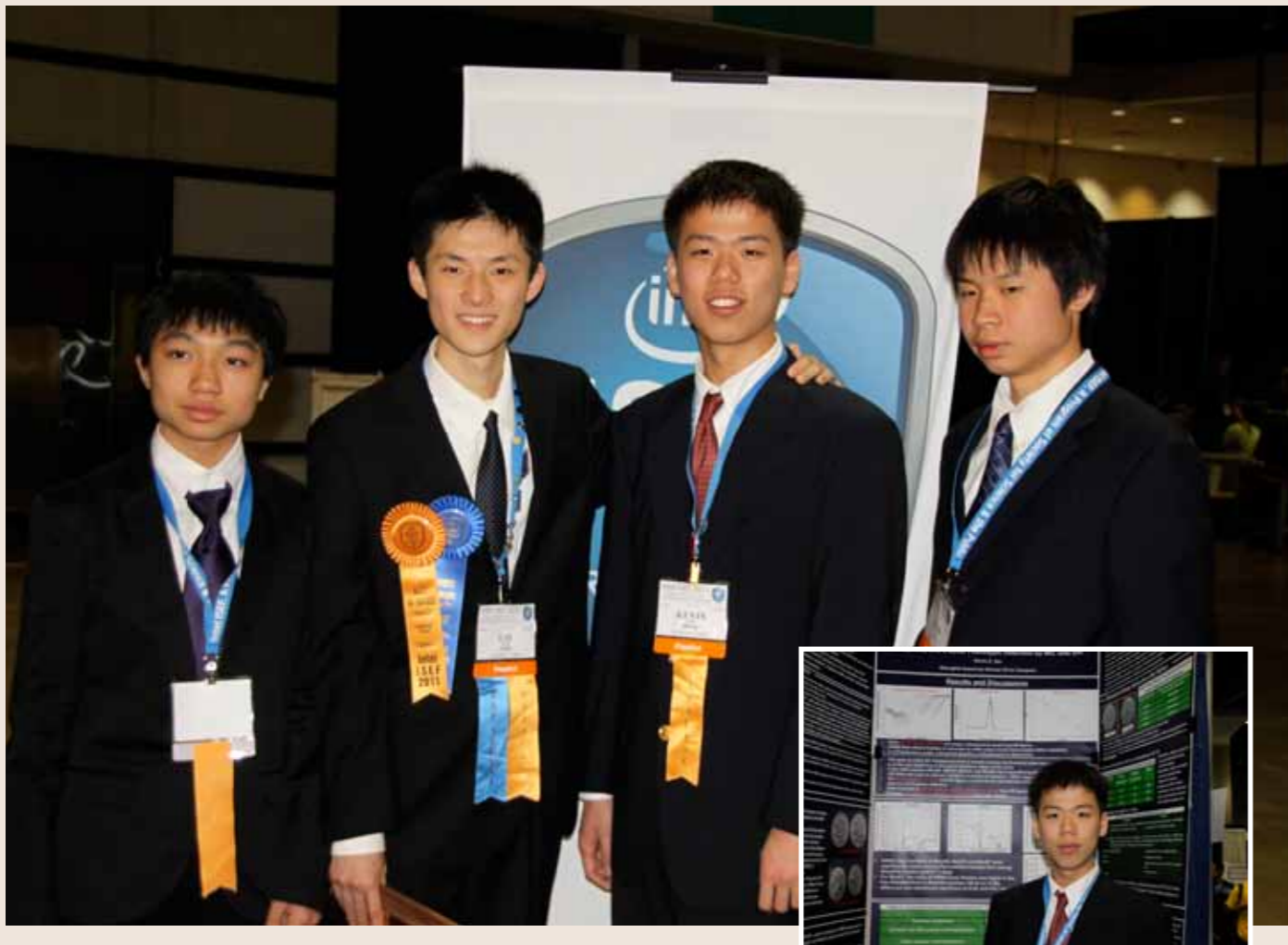

On May 7, Puxi campus high school junior, Kevin Xin, and I—acting as advisor—flew with three Chengdu International School students to Los Angeles, California, in the United States as SAS representatives to the annual Intel International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF). There they joined more than 1,600 high school researchers from 64 countries competing for top placings in their disciplines, including prizes and scholarships totaling over \$4 million USD.

Kevin continues a three-year run of SAS representation SAS at the ISEF as part of the successful Sichuan Region Team delegation of International Schools of China. This year Kevin Xin earned a 4th place special award from the American Association for Clinical Chemistry. Kevin's \$250 USD award recognized his project as one that best demonstrates the

use of chemistry to diagnose diseases and to treat patients. Kevin was not the only winner in our delegation. A three-time participant from our delegation, Xue Lai, was one of the top winners of the entire competition earning a \$3,000 USD First-Place prize in Computer Science, a \$5000 USD Best-of Show prize in Computer Science, and an all-expense paid trip to Finland for the European Union Contest for Young Scientists.

Kevin's project, RT-PCR Genotypic Analysis of Four Mex Efflux Pumps in Pan-resistant *P. aeruginosa* and Development of Novel Phenotypic Detection Method by MIC With Efflux Pump Inhibitors, developed a method of identifying the specific proteins that cause antibiotic resistance in a type of bacteria often infecting patients with cystic fibrosis. Kevin's method could help physicians more quickly choose effective treatments

for patients.

The Intel Corporation along with the Society for Science and The Public sponsor ISEF to encourage academic excellence in science, mathematics, engineering, and technical education. The sponsors recognize that the key to solving the toughest global challenges of our time is harnessing the scientific curiosity and achievement of today's young scientists and engineers.

Kevin's week began with two days of display preparation and safety checks. Students had scheduled events to meet each other at an evening pin-exchange and an evening party at the LA Live activity center. Wednesday was the day of judging when Kevin met with 10 judges from

8:30am to 6pm. After the long day of judging, the famous Hollywood Universal Studios was open until midnight for the exclusive enjoyment of all ISEF participants.

Thursday was public viewing day followed by the evening presentation of special awards by government agencies, science societies, and corporations when Kevin received his award onstage while being shown enlarged on 8-m high video screens. At Friday morning's Grand Awards presentations the Chengdu team member in our delegation received his awards.

After his week of ISEF Kevin said, "I was really excited to see and visit Los Angeles and am honored to have received an award from the AACC."

Kevin's research work at Hua Shan hospital is an example of doing real science and applying learning beyond textbooks. I'm impressed with the extraordinary connections and extensions he made with his AP Biology learning and the poise he showed as a public speaker.

The Intel ISEF experience goes further than awards. Former ISEF participants wrote a book of advice for those interested in conducting research projects. One wrote, "Conferences and collaborations can take you across the world and introduce you to an international, diverse group of people, united by a common language and appreciation for science." Another contributor wrote, "... High school research helped me be a more outgoing and confident individual... I learned to remain calm when asked a difficult question, and I grew comfortable speaking to crowds..."

Conducting a research project allows science-interested students to explore science further than they could in any class. We hope more SAS students will join in the excitement of science research and science fair competitions next year.
